I love the book of Genesis. It lays such a foundation for everything that follows in the rest of the Bible. God is such an intentional author and as we read His Word we start to see incredible patterns and themes. One of the themes that is present throughout all of Scripture is LIGHT.

- · Psalms 18:28 "my God turns my darkness into light."
- Psalms 119:105 "Your Word is a lamp for my feet, a light on my path"
- Micah 7:8 "when I sit in darkness, the Lord will be a light to me"
- · John 9:5 "I am the light of the world" (Jesus)
- 1 Thessalonians 5:5 "You are all children of the light"
- · John 1:5 "the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it"

Light is used to symbolize God throughout the whole Bible. I remember a professor in college speculating that perhaps one day when we all get to heaven, we will suddenly understand the connection between God and light. Perhaps it's not just an analogy, but God actually IS light. In Genesis 1 the very first words we see God speak are the words "Let there be light". Perhaps the very first thing He did in all creation was infuse our dark and formless world with His radiant presence through light.

It was not a coincidence when Jesus stepped into the scene thousands of years after creation and declared "I am the Light of the World". The God who said "Let there be light" sent His Son to banish darkness once and for all.

The God of Genesis is the same God today. No matter what your circumstance this time of year, God is stepping into your story and saying "Let there be light". He wants to light up the dark places, He wants to infuse your heart with the radiance of His presence. When your God is the God of light, darkness loses all of its power.

This Christmas, invite the God of Creation, the Light of the World, into whatever place is dark in your life. His light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not, will not, and never-in-a-thousand-years ... overcome it.

After the Silence

"Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, 14 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to men on whom his favor rests." -Luke 2:13-14

Four hundred years have passed since God last spoke through the prophet Malachi. Four hundred years of silence from God. His last words were not great ... they were words of judgment. "You have wearied the Lord with your words", Malachi told the people. And while there was going to be hope for the future, God was done talking for a season.

Sometimes I wonder if I weary God with my words. My anxious words, my negative words, my critical words, my demanding words ... words that show my lack of listening to anything that God has been trying to tell me. Sometimes, if I am honest, it feels like God is silent.

Have you ever felt that way? That no matter what you do, you just don't seem to hear from God? The Israelites knew that feeling very well. They were desperate for something from God. Some sign that they were still connected to Him. And I love that while God was quiet for a season, He had certainly not abandoned His people ... He was waiting for the right time to restart the conversation.

Fast forward 400 years to a bunch of shepherds sitting out in a field in the dark watching their sheep ... and an otherwise silent night becomes the scene for a heavenly choir concert that announces that God is ready to communicate with mankind again. The night is filled with lights and the glory of the Lord shining around them, and heavenly hosts singing. It's a night like nothing anyone had ever seen before or since. God had something to say and He was going to say it through Jesus.

In an instant everything changed. God was now going to be walking and talking with us in person. And because Jesus came and lived among us; because he gets us ... we don't have to fear the silence. Even when it seems like He is quiet, He is still near. He is still Immanuel ... God with us. So even in the silence, even in the darker moments of life, we can live with a peace that God loves us, desires to be with us, and is always only a whisper away.

Bright City in a Wark World

Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." -Matthew 5:13-16

Growing up as a kid from the country, living five miles out from a small town and over an hour from the nearest freeway, I learned that night is really dark. We lived on the top of a large hill and from our house we could see both Cass City (my home town) and Caro (the next closest). At night, they would be all lit up and it even created a glow on the clouds on an overcast night. Be a Pilot Light for the World

On some flights the night sky would be clear but with no moon in sight. While flying at 11,000 feet all you could see in front of you were small lights from below you, in front of you and above you. The small lights below and in front, of course, were homes or small towns which dot the Caribbean on many islands. The lights above were stars and planets. At some places along the route of flight, it was difficult to pinpoint the horizon because small lights from everywhere all blended so seamlessly together. It all looked like the sky. It could be deceiving. But a quick scan of flight instruments gave me confirmation that all was well, I was straight, level and on course. Then, in due time, I was able to see the lights of the coastline of Florida and knew I would soon arrive safely home with my passengers.

The Lord taught me much about "BEING A LIGHT" through flying. In 2 Corinthians 4:6 we are reminded that God, through Jesus, put His light within us so we can grow in our knowledge of God and Jesus and then share that light with others.

I want to keep asking the Lord everyday to help me not take for granted the "Light" that He has shone in my heart. What an honor, privilege, and yes even responsibility to share the knowledge I have of the light in order to successfully spread that Light to others.

Let's be the best pilots we can be.

I have a feeling when we can keep our eyes focused on HIM, it will be even better than when we finish getting our Christmas lights hung up, stand back, and look at its beauty.

What is hindering you this Christmas season from fixing your eyes on Jesus the way you were called? My encouragement is to untangle yourself from that and run your race the way you know you were called.

In your moment of extreme pain, you think through how you got to this place. The time was just slightly past midnight. Your stomach was rumbling, exclaiming that you had not eaten for at least two hours. The kitchen was calling you out of your cozy bed, but it was dark. You would have to rely on your memory of your home's layout.

Hunger and darkness is what got you to this point. Upon stumbling out of bed for the kitchen, your nemesis, the blue plastic block of terror, pierced your skin. If only you had turned on the light, you would have seen that Lego. Now, that blue block gloats over you as you writhe in pain.

As believers, we must realize that the enemy will put obstacles in our path to cause us to stumble and be in pain. The enemy will use darkness to hide the truth from our eyes. To be brutally honest, I would fathom a guess that we have all fallen prey to those traps of the enemy at some point in our lives. We have found ourselves nursing wounds caused by stumbling over those obstacles.

The Israelites found themselves in the darkness of captivity when the verse from Micah was penned. Although they were in darkness, the Israelites knew that the Lord's light would pierce through the darkness. That the darkness and all that was hidden in the darkness stood no match to the light. As we consider how powerful light is this week, I would challenge you to remember that the darkness that may surround you currently stands no chance to the Light that has come. The enemy CANNOT GLOAT over your missteps and stumblings in the darkness.

Focus on the light that is cast by our Lord, Jesus Christ. He has given us victory over the darkness. Throw aside that blue plastic block of terror to bask in the rays of hope only Jesus can provide.

FOLLOW THE LIGHT | DAY 3

The Star of Bethlehem

"After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi[a] from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, 'Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." -Matthew 2:1-2

We often see stars on the top of Christmas trees and a part of Nativity scenes. We know that the Magi followed some kind of spectacular star to find Jesus, but what do we *actually* know about the Star that the Magi followed?

- · It signified birth.
- · It signified kingship.
- It had a connection to the Jewish nation so Herod didn't recognize it.
- It appeared at a precise time.
- It led the Magi as they went south from Jerusalem and stopped over Bethlehem.

There has been some incredible study done in recent years that points to the science and significance of the Star of Bethlehem, so if this topic interests you, I'd highly recommend checking out "The Star of Bethlehem" DVD by Rick Larson (also available on YouTube).

What Rick Larson's study reveals is that the Star of Bethlehem wasn't just a nice anecdote to the Christmas story, the star was a significant piece that announced the arrival of the King of Kings. Stars orbit in specific and mappable patterns, which when studied and reverse-engineered to the approximate time of Jesus' birth, reveal a sky of stars dancing and shouting of the newborn King!

"Lift up your eyes and look to the heavens: Who created all these? He who brings out the starry host one by one and calls forth each of them by name." Isaiah 40:26

God was using pieces of His creation to announce His Son's coming. This is especially incredible when you think about the fact that when God set those stars in motion at the dawn of creation, He did so knowing the exact moment His son would enter the world thousands of years later.

But here's the thing, Herod missed the Star that was right in front of him because he wasn't looking for it. And that can happen to us too. We can get so lost in the flurry and busyness of the season that we miss Jesus. So let's be certain to slow down, look up to the sky and see how all of creation still points to the King of Kings, our Savior Jesus.

FOLLOW THE LIGHT | DAY 4

aight is Glope

"You, Lord, keep my lamp burning; my God turns my darkness into light." -Psalm 18:28

I had a plumbing issue at my house years ago that caused me to have to go from one side of my house to the other in the crawlspace. The entrance was in one corner and the leak that needed to be fixed was in the opposite corner about 100 ft away. I reached the spot and repaired what I needed to just in time for my flashlight to die with no other light source. It was dark, the darkest I have ever been in. I started to get worried thinking about my return journey until I looked behind me and saw the smallest glimpse of light from the entrance. I had hope!

We spend this time of year celebrating the birth of Jesus as the light of the world. Shepherds were visited by an angel of light to share the good news and Magi from the east followed the light of a star to seek out Christ. Christmas time is such an exciting time with decorations spread throughout communities. Areas that may have been dark are now so bright with different colors of lights, candles, and tinsel. Areas that were already lit are even brighter at Christmas because of the season. Light is such a representation of Christmas and the birth of Christ for all to experience. It is hope!

The combination of the light of Christ and our hope in Him is enough to drive away any amount of darkness. We can find ourselves crawling, lost or out in a field but all we need to do is follow the light and it will bring us hope. This Christmas, look at the lights with such praise and reverence that it drives away anything that doesn't need to be in your life. Jesus was born to bring the ability to trust in Him and be an overcomer. He is hope!

I have never been someone who liked the dark. I don't like going for walks at night and I don't like not being able to see what is out ahead of me. I am not much for camping, for a variety of reasons, but mostly because I am not a fan of sleeping in a tent in the dark in the woods. SHINING LIGHTS | DAY 2

Min't Mo Rock by Todd Perkins • Scripture — Luke 19:36-40

"I tell you," Jesus replied, "if they keep quiet, the stones will cry out." -Luke 19:40

In 1987 there was a song written with the following lyrics, "Ain't no rock gonna cry in my place. As long as I'm alive to glorify His holy name."

The mention of rocks crying out in this song can be found in the context of the triumphal entry—Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem a week before He was killed. Jesus rode on the back of a borrowed donkey's colt, and multitudes of people praised Him as the "king who comes in the name of the Lord." (Luke 19:38) When the Pharisees in the crowd heard the people praising and worshiping Jesus, they said to Him, "Teacher, rebuke your followers for saying things like that!" (vs 39) The Pharisees knew they had no ability to quiet the excited people, so they called on Jesus to stop the crowd from praising Him.

"Jesus replied, "I tell you, . . . if they keep quiet, the stones will cry out." -Luke 19:40

Jesus responds by stating that people's praise for Him should only be encouraged and never extinguished. Colossians 1:16 reminds us that all of creation was made for God's glory.

I find it easy to get excited about small things, family gatherings, games, time together, etc. and there is nothing wrong with that. However, when it comes to sharing Jesus, the Light of the World, my excitement often turns to worry and apprehension. I worry about how people might respond to my invitation to one of the Christmas Eve Services, how others will respond when I share how Jesus has changed my life, and to the hope and grace that only He can give. Often, the Light that is the very reason for my existence is one that I show the least amount of excitement about.

During this season, and every season, may we never allow ourselves to stop praising the name of Jesus for His birth, sacrifice on the cross for the sins of all humanity, and His resurrection. May we always be "shining lights" in a dark world that points people to Jesus and the Father's love for His creation. May we never allow *a rock to cry out in our place* of how wonderful and praiseworthy Jesus is.

A Glouse of Lights by Pastor Dan Hamrick • Scripture — Matthew 5:16

"In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven." -Matthew 5:16

Each year, around the middle of December, our family piles into the minivan, goes to Tim Hortons, orders hot beverages and a large box of Timbits, and then drives around the city looking at Christmas Lights. For one to two hours we drive slowly through neighborhoods judging who has the best lights and why. Each person in the car has different criteria. It could be the house with the most lights, most different colors, coolest design, most creative, or just pretty. This tradition has to be one of my favorites of the Christmas season.

In the book of Matthew we are commanded to "let your light shine before others". When I read this passage I often think of us being the houses in the middle of the Christmas season. I wonder what type of light people see when they pass us on an everyday basis?

The word "shine" means "to give off or reflect light". The light we are supposed to shine and reflect is that of Jesus. What are ways you can "SHINE" you may ask?

- With our **WORDS** Showing respect

- With our **PURITY** Keeping our heart, soul, and mind clean
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot}$ Always pointing back to the $\boldsymbol{\textbf{LIGHT}}$ source Make it about HIM not you

Our goal should be to bring glory to God. There's a fine line between being a light and putting on a show. It's a matter of the heart.

Where is your light shining? Who would people say you reflect? If you were a house of lights, being judged on the criteria of how you shine Jesus, what would people say?


